Dear Parents and Friends

St Mary MacKillop Feast Day 8th August

Last week during a special liturgy we celebrated the feast of St Mary MacKillop. Mary Helen MacKillop RSJ, also known as St Mary of the Cross, was an Australian of Scottish descent who, on the 17 October 2010 was declared a saint by the Catholic Church. Together with Reverend Julian Tenison Woods, she founded the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, a congregation of religious sisters which established a number of schools and welfare institutions throughout Australasia, with an emphasis on education for the rural poor. She is the only Australian thus far to be recognised by the Catholic Church as a saint.

Our School holds a special devotion to St Mary MacKillop as Our Lady of the Rosary Primary School was founded in 1880 by Mary MacKillop and the Sisters of St Joseph. We remember the many things that Mary MacKillop did for others and reflect on how we can continue her legacy, and the mission of the Sisters of St Joseph, in our own lives.

KEEP TRYING UNTIL YOU SUCCEED

Sometimes, human beings behave like bees. If you put several bees in an open-ended bottle and lay the bottle on its side with the base toward a bright light, the bees will keep on flying to the bottom of the bottle towards the light. It never occurs to them to reverse gears and try another direction. This is a combination of genetic programming and learned behaviour.

Put a bunch of flies in that bottle and turn the base towards a bright light. Within a few minutes, all the flies

will have found their way out. They try all directions—up, down, towards the light, away from the light, often bumping into the glass and into each other—but sooner or later they find the neck of the bottle and fly out the opening.

This term you will be faced with many challenges as you seek the bright light of learning. Will you be a bee and stick to the way you have always done things or a fly, trying everything you can until you find the answer?

We often allow ourselves to become locked in our comfortable ways of doing things, even if we are getting nowhere and really want to be reaching in a new direction. What we're doing may make not be helping us, but at least it's familiar.





One of the most important factors in achieving success at school and in life, is the willingness to try things out, to experiment, to test new ground. In fact, this is the only way to learn and progress – by trial and error.

Like the fly, try one way and then another until you succeed. Don't worry about making mistakes along the way. That's the way we all learn.

From the Assistant Principal's desk...

DIVERSITY IS THE NORM AT OLR

"Inclusive practice describes any and all efforts made by a school and its community to make students and their parents feel welcome. Inclusive practice implies that if participation becomes an issue for any student, whether arising from disability, gender, behaviour, poverty, culture, refugee status or any other reason, then the desirable approach is not to establish special programs for the newly identified individual or group need, but to expand mainstream thinking, structures and practices so that all students are accommodated."

(Students with disabilities in mainstream classrooms: A resource for teachers by Anthony Shaddock, Loretta Giorcelli, Sue Smith, p. 12)



At OLR we use a team approach, which allows for a shared responsibility between the Diversity Support Team and the classroom teacher/s. Current research on student learning shows that it is the classroom teacher that makes the biggest difference with student outcomes. It is essential that the classroom teacher drives the learning for their students.

The learning needs of all students, is complex and no one person will have all the answers. So our approach is to build assistance for each student based on the shared wisdom of the Diversity Team, classroom teachers and parents. This also includes those students who are learning beyond the outcomes of their grade. They will be extended and provided with challenges to ensure they are reaching their personalised goals.

The Diversity Team consists of (but is not limited to):

- Diversity Coordinator
- Leadership team
- Diversity teachers
- •Teacher Assistants
- School Counselor
- •Classroom Teachers
- Parents

A further network is made linking the Learning Support Team with related personnel outside the school: Other CEO personnel e.g. The CEDP Well -being team, Child Psychologists, Speech Pathologists and Occupational Therapists.

A team approach within the classroom allows the classroom teacher to cater with greater precision to the range of students in the class. The Diversity teacher is an extra teacher who can work with ALL students not just the targeted students.

Parents are an integral part of the team approach and we endeavour to keep parents involved and informed throughout the year. Our approach is positive and proactive- working with parents as much as possible. We encourage parents to share their concerns and knowledge about their child with the Diversity Team and class-room teacher.

Some students will need individual programs and these students are targeted at all times with regular instruction and/or task modification. All plans for the student's learning consider the strengths and interests of the student rather than simply remediating weaknesses. The aim is to keep the student engaged and learning at all times.

From the Assistant Principal's desk cont'd......

This model does not lock students into focus groups long term but creates flexible groups that change according to need. As much as possible students should be connected to their classroom learning community. All targeted students are capable of learning and should be empowered in their learning so that they are not over-reliant on adult or peer assistance.

Plans are made, goals are set and these are regularly reviewed and modified. PP's are made for all funded students at the beginning of the year and these are reviewed at key points throughout the year. Students who are not funded but who have been targeted as having an academic and /or social need will also have plans and goals set throughout the year.



Our aim at OLR is to provide targeted individual, personalised learning for all students wherever they sit on their academic pathway.

FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION This is a day when we are expected to come together as believing community and attend Mass.

The Feast of the Assumption celebrates the belief that the body and soul of the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken into heaven after the end of her earthly life.

Mary's assumption into heaven is seen by many as a fulfilment of Jesus' promise to all faithful servants; that they too will be received into the kingdom of God.

Mary is seen as the first disciple of Jesus and a model for all disciples; it is fitting that she receive the gift of discipleship first of all.

Belief in the Assumption of Mary had become widespread by the end of the seventh century and was eventually defined in an infallible statement by Pope Pius XII in 1950

REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL.

Gospel Focus - Real Presence

The Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist is a central doctrine of the Catholic faith. It is regarded as a revealed truth proved by both scripture and tradition. This week's gospel, indeed the entire 'Bread of Life' discourse (Jn 6:26-72), is an essential passage of scripture that supports the teaching of Christ present in the Eucharist. Along with scripture, the other proof of the doctrine is tradition. Since the first century, only a brief time after the death of Jesus, Christians linked their celebration of Eucharist with the words of Jesus at the last supper – they celebrated Eucharist as a memorial of Jesus.






