The Bible tells us we are 'wonderfully made' (Psalm 139.14). What does this mean?

Your body is truly amazing and here are some amazing facts.

- **♦ You blink about 15 times a minute.**

17 March, Pray with St Patrick.

St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints. He was born in Roman Britain and when he was fourteen, he was captured by Irish pirates during a raiding party and taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep.

In his memoir he wrote, "The love of God and his fear grew in me more and more, as did the faith, and my soul was rosed, so that, in a single day, I have said as many as a hundred prayers and in the night, nearly the same. I prayed in the woods and on the mountain, even before dawn."



Patrick's captivity lasted until he was twenty, when he escaped after having a dream from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast. There he found some sailors who took him back to Britain and was reunited with his family.

He had a vision, which prompted his studies for the priesthood. He was later ordained a bishop and sent to take the Gospel to Ireland.

Patrick arrived in Slane, Ireland on March 25, 433. There, he converted many people -eventually thousands - and he began building churches across the country.

He often used shamrocks to explain the Holy Trinity and entire kingdoms were eventually converted to Christianity after hearing Patrick's message.

He worked many miracles and wrote of his love for God in Confessions. After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461.

Patrick was a humble, pious, gentle man, whose love and total devotion to and trust in God should be a shining example to each of us. So complete was his trust in God, and of the importance of his mission, he feared nothing -not even death.

"The Breastplate,"

is St Patrick's poem of faith and trust in God:

"Christ be within me.

Christ behind me.

Christ before me.

Christ beside me,

Christ to win me,

Christ to comfort and restore me,

Christ beneath me.

Christ above me,

Christ inquired,

Christ in danger,

Christ in hearts of all that love me,

Christ in the mouth of friend and stranger."

From the Assistant Principal's desk...

At OLR we wear our uniform with pride

Wearing a uniform is a badge of pride, creates an identity for a school and is an important part of being a school student. Uniforms give students a sense of belonging and create an identity for the school in the community.

Some people believe that a school uniform can improve learning by reducing distraction, sharpening focus on schoolwork and making the classroom a more serious environment, allowing students to perform better academically.



Recently we have seen some students wearing accessories that are not part of the uniform. These include: items of clothing under their uniform which are visible, different jackets and hats and inappropriate headwear, jewellery and footwear.

The uniform policy and dress code can be found in the Parent Handbook. It states:

- Children must wear the full and correct school uniform each day.
- Children are to keep their uniform looking neat and tidy. □
- No jewellery is permitted at school except for earrings (studs or sleepers). A cross may be worn but must be tucked inside their shirt or dress for safety.
- Children are to have an appropriate styled haircut. Long hair needs to be tied back.
- Any hair ties, bows etc... must be in the school colours or a black or neutral colour.
- Nail polish is not permitted.

At present all students should be in full SUMMER uniform. If we start to get any cooler days students should wear a jacket or may wear the full winter

uniform. It is not permitted to wear parts of one and parts of the other or clothing underneath such as tights.

Girls should have the dress with short white socks and black school shoes. No tights or long sleeved items should be visible under the uniform. On colder days the school jacket is worn.

Boys should be wearing the school shorts and the short -sleeved shirt with short navy socks and black school shoes.

The sport uniform includes: Royal Blue/Navy/Gold microfibre polo shirt, Royal Blue microfibre shorts. White short socks and predominantly white sports shoes. The school track pants or plain navy tracksuit pants can be worn on cooler days. No tights or bike shorts are to be worn.

Teachers will continue to monitor the students and reminder notes will be sent home if students are persistently wearing incorrect uniform items. We are proud of our school and its reputation in the wider community. We ask for parent support in raising the standards of the uniform at OLR.

- carpenter
- born in Bethlehem, lived in Nazareth
- an angel told Joseph in his dream to take Mary into his home
- in another dream, Joseph was warned to take Mary and Jesus to Egypt
- Joseph disappears from the New Testament before Jesus began his public ministry
- patron Saint of the Universal Church, the Patron Saint of the Sisters of St Joseph (the Josephites), unborn children, travellers, families, workers, happy death, fathers/dads.
- St Joseph is also the patron Saint of many countries including: Russia, Canada, Mexico, Peru, Belgium, Korea, Austria, Vietnam, Bohemia, and also Sicily, Italy.

As a family I invite you to pray the St Joseph prayer regularly throughout the year.

Our continuing challenge and opportunity is to learn how to use these dispositions in contemplation and prayer each day, as we learn how to live as a true follower of Jesus.
