THE THOUGHT THAT DOES COUNT

We are told with a gift that it's the thought that counts. But researchers have found that it actually doesn't, at least not in the way we usually think.

They paired off visitors to a museum - sometimes two strangers, sometimes two friends or relatives - and then one of them was led off to a separate room and asked to choose a gift for the other person from the museum's shop. Some givers were told to pick randomly, while others were told to think carefully about the recipient's tastes.

The thoughtful givers naturally expected their effort to be appreciated, but it usually didn't matter. Even though the recipients knew which gifts had been picked randomly and which had been chosen carefully, it turned out they liked a randomly-chosen gift just as much as a thoughtful one.


As long as the gift was satisfying, the people getting it usually didn't consider how much thought had gone into it.

So if you fear you're doomed to buy a bad gift, then maybe you should find something that shows at least that you made an effort.

Otherwise, the best reason to try hard is for your own pleasure in choosing the gift. When people spend time thinking about a gift for someone else, they feel closer to the person, and that makes them happier.

The teachers' gift to the children is education and all the things that the teachers have done this year. The teachers have put a lot of thought into this gift and a lot of time and effort. I think it is the best gift of all.

A MESSAGE TO PARENTS TO END A DIFFICULT YEAR

Parents work really is harder now. There's so much personal and professional stress, and some people are suffering from what's called helmet fire – a condition that occurs when people are working hard for long hours under lots of pressure, making decisions under time constraints, analysing too much information, and dealing with uncertainty, fear and sadness.



This can result in shutting down entirely; being busy with unproductive work – for example, organising and reorganising – and avoiding key tasks; sticking to initial decisions even when conditions have changed; focusing on one thing to the exclusion of everything else.

One researcher found that those who survive and thrive in emergency situations show playfulness, curiosity, flexibility, humour, empathy and intuition. Another study identified flexibility, adaptability, tolerance for uncertainty, being able to set priorities, working independently when needed and attention to detail.

Be gentle with yourself. Of course this is hard. The world is struggling with a disaster, and you are doing a hard job in a hard time. You are not losing your mind because you are grouchy or forgetting things. How else could it be? Be gentle with others. They are also living and working during the pandemic, in addition to whatever other losses and pain and obstacles they face.



Assume good will and best effort whenever you can. Be strong, which is to say, realise how strong you already are to be doing what you do right now... Finally, be safe. Science is advancing and we are learning new things about the coronavirus all the time.

CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

One of the most popular activities of the Advent and Christmas seasons is the singing of carols. We have "Carols by Candlelight", "Carols in the Park", "Carols in the classrooms" and all express happiness and joy. However, not all carols were composed in happy or joyful circumstances and the "Twelve Days of Christmas" was one such carol. When Henry VIII had his falling out with Pope Clement VII, he set about to dismantle the Catholic Church and to establish the Church of England. Catholics were not permitted to practise their faith openly or even in private; if they were caught, the consequences were severe: heavy fines, imprisonment, even death.

So, Catholics devised a "coded" carol as an instruction tool for their children. It was called the "Twelve Days of Christmas" and its images covered the essentials of their Catholic Faith. The "true love" is God; the "me" is every baptised person; the "partridge in a pear tree" is Jesus and his cross; the "two turtle doves" are the New and Old Testaments"; the "three French hens" are faith, hope and charity; the "four birds" are the four Gospels; the "five golden rings" are the Pentateuch which were the first five books of the Hebrew Scripture that contained the "law" or teaching and instructions; the "six geese-a-



laying" are the six days of creation; the "seven swans" the Gifts of the Holy Spirit; the "eight maids" the Beatitudes; the "nine ladies dancing" the fruits of the Holy Spirit; the "ten lords" the ten commandments; the "eleven pipers" the eleven faithful Apostles; the "twelve drummers" the twelve articles of faith in the Apostles Creed.

Another popular Christmas Activity is to erect the Christmas tree and clothe it with "robes" of decoration. Most probably, the Christmas tree had its origin through a combination of two medieval religious symbols: the Paradise Tree and the Christmas Candle. Around about 1000 A.D. Advent Plays told the stories of creation and the fall of Adam and Eve. Usually, the plays ended with a promise of the coming of a Saviour. The Garden of Eden was depicted by a fir tree with apples hanging on it; it was called the Paradise Tree. The custom moved from being outside plays to being in-home celebra-

tions, where Christians would hang apples and other meaningful items on the tree, including small candles to remind them of God's gift to them of Christ the Saviour, the "light of the world". The Christmas Candle was lit on Christmas Eve to symbolise Christ the light of the world; the candle remained lit for the entire Christmas period.

The third most popular Christmas activity is the setting out of the crib, which is an attempt to reconstruct the stable and manger environment in which Christ was born. The crib, as we know it, dates from St Frances of Assisi who, on Christmas Eve 1223, celebrated the stable scene with a sermon about the humble surrounds into which Jesus was born in the very humble town of Bethlehem.

All these real activities and symbols of Christmas are there to help us to celebrate the real meaning of Christmas: the birth of Jesus, God's Son. It is somewhat of a forlorn wish that peace will be in our home during the Christmas period, as peace runs the great risk of being overrun by feverish activity, which could mean that all the "superficials" are well attended to, while stress levels are given a "boost" and home budgets given a "bust".

Christmas should be a time of great celebration but within an atmosphere of peace and joy. "I bring to you good news of great joy, for to you is born this day a saviour who is Christ the Lord."

Semester 2 Reports



On Friday, the children will bring home their Semester 2 Report. This report will look different from previous years.

In response to changes to the learning and teaching environment during COVID-19, we have needed to adjust the assessment and reporting processes. While this report will look different, it will still provide you with valuable information about your child's learning, while complying with government requirements.

Whilst we usually assess using a 5 point scale, this report has been adjusted to a 3 point scale:

Working Towards Working At **Working Beyond**

There will also be a grade for the child's effort toward their learning.

Teachers always use a variety of Data sets to determine a Grade and Comment for the children's report. However, due to the fact that the students worked from home for a Term and a half this Semester and have only been back at school for a relatively short time the report has been adjusted accordingly.

This Semester 2 report recognises and reflects the student's learning in three focus key learning areas: Religious Education, English and Mathematics.

- In English, there are 2 comments showing what the child is able to do... And 1 comment to indicate an area they are working towards.
- In Mathematics, there will be 1 comment indicating what the child is able to do. And 1 comment to indicate an area they are working towards.

The LIGHTHOUSE TRAITS are divided into the 3 areas of our Learning agreement...

Safe Respectful Learner

These traits are an indication of the child's approach to their learning - how they are able to work independently and how they cooperate with others. This allows parents to see areas of strength and areas for improvement in regards to resilience, attitude, willingness to reflect and social skills.

There will also be a **General Comment** which in most instances will discuss a child's approach to learning - academically, behaviourally and socially. The teacher may also discuss another Key Learning Area the child has shown a particular strength in.

There will be an additional comment on the report if your child is considered 'at risk' in terms of their attendance - either during Home Learning, where they may have not consistently participated in the learning provided by the teacher. Or they may have had several full or partial absences since returning to school.

As always, we continue to work in partnership with you, the parents, who are the child's first educators. We ask you to discuss the report with your child you child your child and set a few goals for 2022.

Once again, we thank you sincerely for the support you have given to the staff during what has been one of the most difficult years of schooling for students and teachers.



We look forward to continuing your child's learning journey with you in 2022.
