HAPPY EASTER

"Happy Easter!" Well, almost. There are still a few days to go before we enter into the joys of "Chocolate Land!" Of course, one important thing to do before we loosen our belts on Easter Sunday, is to have a bit of a rethink about what actually happened on the first Easter day.

No doubt, if we had been alive in Jesus' time we, too, would have been astonished by the miracle of a resurrected person. Luke tells us that just as Jesus was entering the town of Naim, a funeral procession was coming out.



Because He lives, I can face tomorrow. Because He lives, All fear is gone. Because I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living just because He lives.

The dead man was the only son of a widow. Jesus was filled with compassion for the widow and so went over to the coffin and said, "Young man! Get up, I tell you. The dead man sat up and began to talk and Jesus gave him back to his mother." Luke 7:11-17. Mark tells us how in like manner Jesus resurrected the twelve year old daughter of Jairus, an official of the local synagogue. "Little girl I tell you to get up. She got up at once and started walking around. Give her something to eat." Mark 5:22-24, 35-44.

The two individuals raised to life by Jesus returned to their normal lives. So, how was their "resurrection" different to Jesus'? Well, "Jesus' Resurrection was about breaking out into an entirely new form of life.

Unlike the widow's son and the daughter of Jairus, "Jesus has not returned to a normal human life in this world like Lazarus and the others whom Jesus raised from the dead. He has entered upon a different life, he has entered the vast breadth of God himself, and it is from there that he reveals himself to his followers." "In Jesus' Resurrection, a new possibility of human existence is attained that affects everyone and that opens up a future, a new kind of future, for mankind."

Now, what would you have been thinking if you were one of Jesus' followers on that first Easter day? "....they were simply overwhelmed by the reality, but after their initial hesitation and astonishment, they could no longer ignore that reality. It is truly he. He is alive; he has spoken to us; he has allowed us to touch him, even if he no longer belongs to the tangible in the normal way."

Jesus' disciples were quite used to Jesus performing the unusual: restoring sight to the blind; restoring mobility to the crippled; curing lepers of their disease. But now they had to grapple with a new understanding of Jesus: "He was quite different, no mere resurrected person but one living anew and forever in the power of God. And yet, at the same time, no longer belonging to our world, he was truly present there, he himself. It was an utterly unique experience, which burst upon the normal boundaries of experience and yet for the disciples was quite beyond doubt."

So, when Easter Sunday does arrive we can join with the writer of Psalm 117 in saying, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad". We can rejoice and be glad, because Jesus, through his humanity, has given us the opportunity of true resurrection. However, as the resurrected Jesus said to the once doubting Thomas, "You believe in me Thomas, because you have seen me; happy are those who have not seen me, but still believe." John 20:29. That's us.

SAFE RESPECTFUL LEARNERS

Did you know that kindness was once a Knightly Virtue? Knightly virtues were part of every mediaeval Knight's code of honour and were standards that Knights tried to adhere to in their daily living and interactions with other people. Thanks to the Kindness Movement, kindness has not been left behind in the Middle Ages.





The Kindness Movement tells us that, "Participating in regular small acts of kindness is beneficial to your health, longevity and well-being; making the decision to be a little kinder will bring more pleasure and direction to your life than ever before." What's more, "The practice of being kinder is a simple way to make your life more joyful and fulfilling. So, relax, enjoy, be friendly, laugh, be playful, help others. Focus on the things you enjoy rather on the things that annoy."

What good advice all that is! Does your family or your school need a "Kindness Movement" of its own making? A kind person is one who is described as being friendly, generous, warm-hearted, sympathetic, considerate, gentle, affectionate, forgiving. Could your home or school do with more people like this? Well, whether kindness blossoms or lies dormant depends on whether it is nurtured. Parents and teachers have the power to instill kindness in children by being supportive and affirming. If children learn to understand how others think and feel, they will better understand how their choices affect other people. If we act in a kindly manner and do things in the same way we expect our children to act and do, then, our children will have a much better chance to be kind people.

Here's a little story: "As the bus slowed down at the crowded bus stop, the bus conductor leaned from the platform and called out, 'Six only!' The bus stopped. The conductor counted on six passengers, rang the bell, and then, as the bus moved off, called to those left behind, 'Sorry, plenty of room in my heart but the bus is full.' The conductor left behind a row of smiling faces. It's not what you do, it's the way you do it." The Friendship Book of Francis Gay.



If we teach our children about love and kindness by teaching them with love and kindness, they experience the good feelings that come with being helped. From this, they understand for themselves the value of helping, because they know that when they share kindness, they are making others feel good. Furthermore, they will be better able to understand that, when someone does something hurtful to them, they should try to handle it in a way that supports forgiveness not revenge, to make peace not war. In our current society, there is the need to teach our children what "attractive" really means. The new trend of "Lookism" tends to present social acceptability as based upon how a person looks. But being "attractive" encompasses many traits such as kindness, friendliness, thoughtfulness, being interesting, being a healthy eater and having an individual and natural body image. Who you are on the inside is much more important than what you look like on the outside.


At OLR we are all Learners...

Fundamental truth

The story of Jesus' passion is not an attempt to answer the question 'Why do people have to suffer?' It does, however, proclaim a fundamental truth. Jesus did not come to prevent human suffering, but rather to consume it with his presence. Over the centuries it is the Cross on Calvary that has changed the moral landscape of the world. The mystery of the Cross is Jesus' final act of love – it encompasses all his actions throughout his life – his touch of a leper, his tenderness towards the sick and bereaved, his tears at Lazarus' grave in which we see the deeply compassionate Jesus at work and so much more. This time last year it was almost impossible to talk about anything other than the coronavirus and the chaos that had enveloped our world. The fact that Easter was just around the corner seemed like a mere afterthought! It is highly improbable for us to even imagine the thought that in another 2000 years people would still be talking about the coronavirus. And yet, here we are in the 21st century, and still talking about the significance of the passion, death and Resurrection of Jesus.

The story of Easter is the revelation of God's wonderful window of divine surprises. It offers to all people freedom from their burdens, guilt and inner turmoil. It promises liberation, hope and new beginnings. Easter Sunday fills Christians with the realisation we are not living our lives in vain. It assures us there is life beyond our earthly lives.

Hopeful perspective

Human death attempts to extinguish the light of hope within us. The Resurrection of Jesus offers us an eternal and hopeful perspective of death.

Our world needs Easter. We need it more than we possibly realise. We need to be reminded that Good Friday is not the end. The image of the glorified Cross and Jesus nailed to it is of supreme importance to all Christians. It is the way we celebrate our baptism. It is what we celebrate in the Eucharist. It is the cornerstone of our being. It is the living Paschal Mystery. And ultimately, it is the triumph of the Resurrection.
