GOOD MANNERS



This week I would like to further explore our learning agreement:

WE ARE SAFE RESPECTFUL LEARNERS

by sharing some thoughts on Good Manners.

Because some students' constant heads-down focus on their electronic devices, it's often hard for them to learn to interact appropriately with other people.

They are more comfortable texting or sending an email to communicate than offering a warm smile. To help children develop personal relationships, they need to be taught the skills of interacting with others.

S.P.E.C.I.A.L.

- Shake hands a firm, appropriate grip (rare since C19 pandemic)
- **P**osture standing up straight, shoulders back, conveying confidence and awareness;
- Eye contact looking the other person in the eye during the entire interaction;
- Charm –a smile, head nod, laugh;
- Introduce yourself saying, "Hi, I'm ----" gets the ball rolling;
- Ask a question "What brings you here?" or "Don't you hate this weather?" begins a conversation and shows interest in the other person;
- Lean in and listen without invading the person's space, getting a little closer signals engagement and helps you listen and respond appropriately.

These elements make children come across as confident and keen students. They need practice so they become natural. It's good to start at an early age teaching children to introduce themselves, start a conversation, look people in the eye and answer politely.

By high school, students should be able to start a good conversation and mingle when meeting new people.

How can adults help?

- Greet children every morning by name and expect them to do the same to you.
- Shake their hands so they learn how to do it naturally.
- Expect your children to stand up and greet visitors and look after their comfort by offering a seat or refreshments.
- Insist on polite interactions at the meal table and in family groups.
- Use literature, current events and TV programmes to encourage children to develop genuine curiosity about other people and what makes them tick.

BUILDING CHILDREN'S LITERACY SUCCESS

Parents and carers are key players in children's literacy success. They work together best when



there is joy and happiness around reading. This happiness and success can transfer into the classroom and it may make a clear difference to children's success as a reader and writer.

READING IS SO IMPORTANT

• Reading has always been an important skill. In our modern world it is more important than ever.

- Children learn about the importance of reading as they watch family members use reading and writing for everyday purposes.
- Reading with your child at home will help your child in *all learning ar-eas of school.*

• Children see you reading and writing in everyday life – reading for pleasure, sharing a story with your child, using a recipe, making a shopping list, writing a birthday card or reading street signs. This teaches them that reading and writing are useful skills in today's world.

READING WITH YOUR CHILD AT HOME

• Involve your children in everyday conversations. Developing Oral Language skills is a huge stepping stone to Literacy success.

- **Read aloud to children.** It helps them to learn the language of books and will encourage them to enjoy books and reading.
- Talk about books. Read together and make reading an enjoyable, shared activity.

• Make sure there is a **wide range of reading material** for your child at home, both fiction and non-fiction. Parents can also borrow books from our school library.

• It is important to read to your child in **your home language** if your first language is not English. Evidence shows that using your home language will help your child to learn to read in English.

• Make a special time for reading with your child, away from interruption.

• Listen to your child every day, even for a short time.

• Give books as treats and presents.



The MOre that you read, the MOre things You will know. The MOre that you Learn, the MOre places you'll go.




Here are some strategies that may assist you as parents, to develop positive reading experiences with your child:

Some parents are unsure of how to support their child's reading at home.

Below are some strategies and ideas you can use to support your child's literacy success.

• Share the Reading. It is OK to have the child reading along and echo -reading behind the parent. This supports a struggling reader who finds reading a challenge – it provides them with good role modelling and an opportunity to experience success when reading. This positive experience can change the child's thoughts about themselves as a reader.



• When a child struggles with a word, resist the temptation to immediately give them the word. Say things like, 'Go back and reread', 'Does that make sense?' 'Did that sound right?','Have another look at that'. These strategies help the child to become an independent reader and develop comprehension strategies.

• Share jokes; read newspapers; **read the things that you love to read;** a magazine that you've picked up off the shelf, labels, recipes, instructions for games. Your ten minutes reading together may just prove how important reading is for enjoyment, life skills and fun! There is no right book, there's only access into many books and parents can help children get really excited about that possibility.

REMEMBER: We want parents and their children to work together in a context of joy and happiness around reading - because that's what will transfer into the classroom; and it's really going to make a difference to how that child feels about themselves as a reader, and give them a boost towards success.

As well as their take- home readers, our children have access to the school Library, e-Library and the PM ecollection.

If you ever have any concerns about your child, our teachers are always available so call and make an appointment.

COMPASS PARENT PORTAL

We are in the process of switching our main communication tool to the Compass Parent Portal. We will eventually be disabling the Skoolbag app.

A letter will soon be sent with your login details for Compass, if you haven't already accessed the



parent portal with the details emailed to you last year. It is most important to keep your Username and Password secure, just like your bank account details, they should not be shared with anyone, including your children.

Using the Compass Parent Portal you will be able to:

- Be informed of important updates, events and reminders
- ◊ View the school calendar
- ◊ Review your child's attendance
- Provide explanations for periods of absence
- Update your contact details
- View your child's semester reports
- Book Parent/Student/Teacher Conferences

Accessing Compass

It is more important than ever that we are able to communicate effectively, especially when it involves the safety of our children. If you haven't already, we ask that parents download the Compass app onto your device for either Apple or Android.

Compass is a web based application that is accessible on any modern web browser (Internet Explorer, Firefox, Chrome, Safari) or by downloading the App called 'Compass School Manager' available through Apple Store or Google Play store for Android users.

For Google Android Users Click on the "Get it on Google play" button above, or go to the Google Play Store, search for "Compass School Manager" and download the free Compass app. Search for *[enter school name]* you're ready to go!

Access Details

The first time you login you will be required to change your temporary password and confirm your email address as well as your mobile phone number. These details will be used by the School for password recovery and email communication. This login will allow you access for all the children in your family
